Reykjavik

jostled our ship during this day, though the Captain securely navigated us through them, and we soon arrived in calmer waters.






At Sea - Day 2

A magical few minutes was had by all, as this once-in-a-lifetime event unfolded before our eyes.







Prince Christian Sound

In the morning, the Expedition Team provided a thrilling small boat cruise around the stunning environs of Prince Christian Sound. Guests marvelled at ancient stone rock faces, rushing waterfalls, and a jagged blue glacier. In the afternoon, guests attended a fascinating

lecture by cultural ambassadors on academic concepts about Inuit culture. Many guests also enjoyed the ship's scenic cruising through the remainder of the sound.





Kvanefjord

After a peaceful morning of lectures and wildlife watching, we arrived in the stunning Kvanefjord. Many guests took to the sapphire blue waters for a glorious afternoon of kayaking, while others participated in a science boat session. The landing provided guests with beautiful

views over the fjord and the glacier. The Thule grave sites and a goliath cloven boulder close to a peaceful viewpoint were of particular interest. In the evening, we departed Kvanefjord and headed northwards, continuing our adventure.





Nuuk

In the morning, we arrived in Greenland's vibrant, beautiful, and historic capital of Nuuk. Guests spent the day exploring the city, spending money in shops selling beautiful local artworks and crafts and attending a guided walk. In the afternoon, a wonderful cultural exposition was attended by many guests in Nuuk's Katuaq Cultural

Centre. There, guests were treated to an amazing performance of traditional masked dancing. In the afternoon, guests attended a fascinating lecture on the technology and cultures of early human Arctic occupants. We departed Nuuk and continued our course further north.





Sisimiut

After crossing the Arctic Circle in the morning, sunshine greeted us in the colourful town of Sisimiut. Some of us strolled through the charming town with its colourful wooden houses before visiting the arts and crafts shops and a local museum. Others went on a mountain

hike or a discovery walk. In the afternoon, we listened to an Arctic Sounds Concert at the Taseralik Culture Center in Sisimiut. We ended the day learning about forbidden songs and traditional Greenlandic drumdancing hosted by our Cultural Ambassador, Varna.





Ilulissat & Eqip Sermia Glacier

Today, we planned to go to Iluissat, but strong winds and high swell made it impossible to safely go ashore. Our captain and Expedition Leader, Tomski, found an alternative. We cruised with the small boats close by the Eqip Sermia glacier, which is calving a lot and the bay

was filled with huge icebergs. We enjoyed the Arctic scenery even more when it started to snow. Different shapes and shades of blue - truly natural art! Sometimes the plan B can be even better then plan A. What an expedition!


At Sea - Baffin Bay

On our second day at sea, we woke to an absolutely beautiful and gentle ocean. Fram glided through the calm water, which was as still as a lake. Many of us spent a lot of time out on deck to enjoy the crossing of Baffin Bay in such beautiful conditions. Today, we learned

about Inuit games, Henry Hudson, and some joined the art corner or the knitting get-together. The day ended with a magnificent sunset! A sky like an aquarell painting with purple, pink, yellow and golden tones. What a welcome to the Northwest Passage.







Pond Inlet

After two seadays, we arrived at Pond Inlet, where we spent half a day. We were greeted with warm smiles and the local guides showed us around the community. Our walk ended in the culture house where we enjoyed traditional music, Inuit games, drum dances and even

throat singing. In the afternoon, we enjoyed lots of onboard activities, such as the Science Centre Session "A closer look at Ice" and a lecture from our cultural ambassadors about the Expressions of Inuit in music, art and traditional practices.





Dundas Harbour & Croker Bay

We landed in the morning at Dundas Harbour, an abandoned settlement on Devon Island. It was a government outpost established in 1924 with the intention to curb foreign whaling and other activity. We enjoyed the landscape and the view from the hill over this little

ghost town and the cemetery. In the afternoon, we went small boat cruising at Croker Bay and enjoyed the glacier front in lovely sunshine. Some of us even spotted some seals infront of the glacier.

Radstock Bay & Beechey Island

During the morning hours we sailed through Radstock Bay, and at the same time, we got offered lots of onboard activities. Benjamin told us about the famous Franklin Expedition, a special chapter in the history of the Northwest Passage. Before heading out to Beechey Island, the

Expedition Team ran a question and answer session for us. At Beechey Island, in addition to the very special history, we experienced very authentic Arctic weather. We saw the first snow and minus degrees while ashore.





Bellot Strait

Today, we sailed through the Bellot Strait and spotted three polar bears. What's more, beluga whales swam along the coastline. The bears were partly hidden in the fog, which gave this encounter a very characteristic atmosphere. What a spotting!! We continued the scenic sailing and enjoyed the onboard program provided by the Expedition Team.

Pasley Bay & Victory Point

In the morning, we planned to go ashore at Pasley Bay, but a polar bear was spotted in the area and the Expedition Team had to come back on board. Laura, our environmental scientist, gave us a lecture about Sea Ice. We learned from Benjamin about Amundsen's Gjøa

Expedition, which was the first time a vessel made it all the way through the Northwest Passage. We also heard from the Cultural Ambassadors about what Roald Amundsen learned from the Inuit. The day ended with the Crew Band of MS Fram giving us a great show!





Jenny Lind Island

The Northwest Passage provided us with very authentic weather today - a lot of fog! This weather made it very unsafe to go ashore, because it would have been impossible to spot a polar bear in

time. Laura, our Environmental Scientist, gave us a lecture about Sea Ice. We also learned about Urban Inuit Identities and how narwhales, beluga and bowhead whales respond to marine vessel traffic.

of the trip, their favourite moments, and we enjoyed the captain's farewell. The ship left Gjøa Haven through the famous and hard to navigate Simpson Strait, heading towards Cambridge Bay, where our voyage sadly ended.
