At Sea, Chile - Nov 3, 2024 427.3 km


Day 3

the activities we can expect to participate in once we reached Antarctica.








Castro, Chile - Nov 4, 2024 305.6 km

Day 4

As we sailed south, we were surrounded by beautiful fjordlands that sheltered us from the weather we were to experience at midday. Our

first taste of big seas in preparation for the Drake Passage!







Our second day in the Chilean Fjords was spent either on deck, watching for wildlife, or at one of the various onboard activities. We had the opportunity to learn traditional card weaving, listen to many

lectures and even learn Salsa in the Explorer Lounge. In the afternoon we arrived at the spectacular Amelia Glacier and went cruising in our zodiacs along the glacier front!








Day 7 - 8

This morning, we arrived at the White Narrows, the small channel that stood as the gateway to Puerto Natales. It is crucial to wait for the right moment - slack tide, before sailing through the Narrows. After docking we boarded buses and made our way to the Milodon Caves about 20 minutes out of town. The next day, we ventured into the Torres del

Paine National Park. The sun was shining and the sky was clear blue as we drove into the park, stopping along the way to take in the breathtaking scenery. We spotted wildlife such as condors, guanacos, a Patagonian Ilama, and there was even a puma spotted stalking the land!







This morning, we said goodbye to Puerto Natales to recross the White Narrows and begin our voyage towards Drake Passage. We remained in the fjordlands during the day and were afforded stunning views of the surrounding land as we sailed south.






The day was spent sailing through the Beagle Channel, reaching the stunning Pia Glacier in the mid-afternoon. The glacier stood as tall as

the Nansen as we approached, and the weather stayed clear, affording us a beautiful view of Pia.







Such luck! We were able to land today on the infamously stormy landing site of Cape Horn. We were ferried over in the zodiacs and disembarked onto the rocky beach before making our way up the 150

steps to the top of the island and the monument that stands as a marker for the end of the world.





Our luck held as we crossed the often treacherous Drake Passage. The Antarctica. It was definitely a 'Drake Lake' and not a 'Drake Shake'! weather held and eased our passage south towards our destination,





Our first stop was at Deception Island in the South Shetland Islands.

Early in the morning, we sailed through the narrow entrance of

Neptune's Bellows and into the fabled caldera. We spent the day on

land, walking the edges of a crater - some very brave souls even went swimming and kayaking in this still-active volcano!





Landing at Damoy Point today we encountered our first colony of Gentoo penguins! But the day offered so much more - we cruised between the ginormous icebergs, walked amongst the penguin colonies and even visited the bright salmon pink Damoy Hut. As we learned, parts of the snowy hills used to serve as an airstrip, and our snowshoers made their way up to the viewpoint! The day ended with the campers going ashore to spend the night in the silence of Antarctica.









Paradise Bay, a majestic bay ringed with its dramatic glaciers, really lives up to its name! We set out in the zodiacs to explore this amazing place and were lucky enough to spot a leopard seal sleeping on the ice. We also landed at the Argentinian research station, Base Brown, where more Gentoo penguins greeted us with their calls - and their

smell... After a short break inside the warmth of the ship, we headed out in our zodiacs one more time to get a glimpse of the Chinstrap penguins living on Orne Island. With the snow coming down thick, it really was the perfect Antarctic evening.

of the waves, watching the seabirds soar by the ship on the stormy winds.
