


MS Roald Amundsen

Dramatic geography and penguins

Red Rock Ridge was a world of wonders packed into a single landing.

The rugged mountain formations were truly striking, creating a

dramatic backdrop for our first encounter with a penguin colony.

Along the way, a few curious skuas made an appearance, but the real

highlight was the penguins—especially the tiny, fluffy chicks. Watching the parents feed them was an unforgettable sight, one that will stay with us forever, both in our memories and in our hearts.





Polar Plunge!

The morning excursion was incredible, but what came next took the excitement to a whole new level! At Blind Bay, we paused beside a breathtaking polar landscape, just meters from floating sea ice. Then, the tender pit opened, offering a rare and exhilarating opportunity—a polar plunge below the Antarctic Circle. How often does one get the chance to do that?

It was an absolute thrill. One by one, guests took the leap into the freezing water, emerging with wide-eyed exhilaration. And despite the bone-chilling shock, every single one of them agreed—it felt amazing. A true adrenaline rush!





A Landing WHERE???

Just when we thought the day couldn't possibly get any better, the expedition team surprised us with an experience that left us all in awe—they found an ice floe sturdy enough for a landing. Who would have thought that was even possible?

This landing was undoubtedly a fan favourite below the Antarctic Circle—an experience impossible to forget. Set in a truly amazing location, the dramatic landscape alone was breathtaking. Adding to its intrigue, we encountered two former scientific stations that operated before and after WWII, remnants of human presence in this remote

wilderness.

As we hiked up, we came across a small abandoned tank, an eerie yet mesmerizing sight against the stark, icy backdrop. But the true highlight was the towering glacier before us, its deep rumbles and occasional calving creating a spectacle we will remember forever.







The Greatest Arch

This day was nothing short of magical. Once again, the weather was spectacular, setting the perfect stage for our cruise through Martha Strait. Everywhere we looked, glacial ice and sea ice created a mesmerizing landscape. Along the way, we spotted several seals

resting on the ice, and some guests even glimpsed whales in the distance. But the true highlight was an absolutely colossal glacial arch, far grander than any of us could have imagined.







Mount Scott and Another Sunny Day

The landing was simply spectacular—smooth terrain, breathtaking views of the icebergs, and penguins as photogenic as ever. But for many, the most striking feature was Mount Scott. This remarkable

peak, with its dramatic, near-vertical glaciers cascading toward the sea, was a sight to behold. Adding to the experience, Petermann Island served as our gateway to the legendary Lemaire Channel.

Towering, ice-clad peaks rose dramatically toward the sky, their sheer scale both humbling and awe-inspiring.
