



MS Spitsbergen


Day 1 - Embarkation in Fairlie

Passengers boarded the ship at Fairlie on a glorious sunny day, filled with excitement and eager anticipation to see Spitsbergen in her new livery. As the lines were cast off and the ship gently eased away from the dock, Fairlie faded into the distance, giving way to open water

and the promise of the islands ahead.









Day 2 - Isle of Arran






