Science & Education Program

Our Science and Education Team accompanied you during your expedition to the remote nature of the North East Atlantic.

We had the opportunity to explore our destination's natural beauty, exceptional wildlife, and rich history. We organized lectures and interactive activities onboard and explored our destinations during landings, excursions and from the water.

History

In Iceland, we explored the history and mythology of the Norsemen, likely the island's first settlers, along with key developments in Icelandic society over time.


In Svalbard, we observed remains from early human activity – traces of whaling, trapping, and mining – offering insight into the archipelago's historical industries.



Culture

On May 17th, upon arriving in Svalbard, we celebrated Norwegian Constitution Day with traditional festivities – including the ceremonial hoisting of the Norwegian flag at 8 AM and delicious waffles and ice cream – giving everyone an authentic taste of Norwegian culture.

NASA Globe Cloud Observer

Together with our Environmental Scientist Liam you observed the clouds and submitted your observations to NASA GLOBE Observer on 5 occasions.

These cloud observations can help NASA improve our understanding of Earth's atmosphere and climate by providing valuable data for scientific research and climate modelling.

You conducted five NASA Globe Cloud Observer citizen science projects. That means five submissions went to NASA for climate study in areas you visited, at sea, along our voyage. Below is a link to our data.

iNaturalist

Throughout our expedition, we documented the flora and fauna of Svalbard and uploaded all our findings to the iNaturalist platform.

During our voyage, we submitted 86 observations of 49 different species. This effort contributes to the creation of a comprehensive understanding of the current distribution of species in the archipelago and can aid researchers in their ongoing studies and conservation efforts to protect these species.

ORCA

On your voyage, ORCA Ocean Conservationist Becky completed 19.5 hours of cetacean surveys (whales, dolphins and porpoise) with your help out on deck.

Becky recorded, 6 humpback whales, 1 orca, 17 white-beaked dolphins, 8 unidentified whales, 1 unidentified dolphin, with a grand total of 36 cetaceans sighted during her surveys. Additional species seen outside of surveys included orca, ringed seal, bearded seal, and walrus.

Understanding cetacean distribution is vital for their protection, Surveys such as these support ORCA's work, to help conserve and protect them in oceans across the globe.

e-Bird

During our Wildlife Watches, our Team conducted detailed seabird surveys, recording observations for the citizen science platform eBird. We recorded 46 different species of birds in 33 checklists.

This initiative helps contribute valuable data to global bird conservation efforts, enhancing our understanding of seabird populations and their habitats.
