


Hamburg - Embarkation Day!



Lysefjorden - Norway

Today brought our first expedition day and a true taste of Norway's raw natural beauty as MS Fridtjof Nansen entered the dramatic Lysefjorden. Surrounded by towering granite cliffs and cascading waterfalls, the fjord welcomed us with calm waters and breathtaking scenery - a perfect setting for exploration.

In the morning, guests geared up for an exhilarating zodiac cruise along the fjord. Gliding across the glassy surface, we were treated to close-up views of sheer rock faces, hidden coves, and wildlife including seabirds and the occasional curious seal. Our guides shared insights into the region's geology and history, enriching the experience as we floated beneath the shadow of ancient cliffs shaped by glacial forces. For a group of adventurous guests, the day included a guided hike to Preikestolen, or "Pulpit Rock," one of Norway's most iconic viewpoints. The challenging ascent was rewarded with panoramic views high above the fjord - an unforgettable moment that truly captured the spirit of expedition travel. Standing on the edge of the plateau, with

Lysefjorden stretching out far below, was both humbling and exhilarating.

Back on board, guests exchanged stories and photos over dinner, many still buzzing from the day's experiences. As the ship gently made her way back out of the fjord, the evening light cast a golden hue over the cliffs - a fitting end to an extraordinary day of adventure.





Lerwick - Shetland Islands


This morning, MS Fridtjof Nansen docked in Lerwick, the charming capital of the Shetland Islands. As we approached the harbour, guests were greeted by a quaint townscape of stone buildings, colourful fishing boats, and the green hills beyond - a peaceful yet lively gateway to Scotland's northernmost isles.

After breakfast, guests joined a guided walk through Lerwick, led by local experts eager to share the island's rich heritage. The walk took us along the historic waterfront, past the 18th-century lodberries buildings once used by merchants to unload cargo directly from the sea. We wandered through narrow, winding lanes, learning about Lerwick's Norse roots, its strategic importance during wartime, and the enduring traditions of island life.

In the afternoon, some guests ventured farther afield on optional excursions, such as a visit to the Jarlshof archaeological site, where layers of history dating back over 4,000 years are preserved in the coastal landscape. Others chose to enjoy the local cafés and shops, or simply soak in the sea views from the harbour.

Back on board, we shared our impressions during the evening recap, reflecting on a day that combined gentle adventure with meaningful cultural discovery. The Shetlands have a quiet magic - and today, they made us feel both welcome and wonderfully far from the ordinary.





Tórshavn - Faroe Islands

Today we made landfall in Tórshavn, the charming capital of the Faroe Islands, nestled between misty hills and a rugged coastline. Though our stay was shortened due to an approaching storm system, we made the most of the morning hours in this unique and remote corner of the North Atlantic.

After an early breakfast, guests disembarked to explore the town and its surroundings. Some joined guided walks through the historic old quarter of Tinganes, where colourful turf-roofed houses and narrow stone lanes reflect centuries of Faroese tradition. Others enjoyed the peaceful atmosphere along the waterfront or visited local shops and cafés for a taste of daily life in this windswept island community. Even with limited time ashore, the Faroes left a lasting impression. The dramatic landscape, with its steep cliffs and rolling green hills, seemed all the more mysterious beneath low-hanging clouds—a powerful reminder of nature's presence in this remote archipelago.

Back on board by late morning, the Captain and expedition team briefed us on the changing weather conditions. With a storm front advancing, we set sail earlier than planned to ensure a safe and comfortable journey onward. As MS Fridtjof Nansen pulled away from Tórshavn's harbour, guests gathered in the lounges to watch the rugged Faroese coast disappear into the mist, grateful for even a brief glimpse of this remarkable place.
