### Day 3 – At Sea, En Route to Ilulissat



and wildlife we are encountering along the way.



### Day 4 — A Full Day in Ilulissat



Guests had the full day to explore at their own pace. Many visited the impressive Icefjord Centre to learn more about the region's glaciology and climate, while others opted for boat excursions to witness the


With the icebergs catching the golden light of the Arctic evening, the day came to a close with a deep sense of wonder and appreciation for this extraordinary part of the world.







The mighty ice fjord of Ilulissat!




#### Day 5 – At Sea, Heading North past Melville Bay

As we cruised through these isolated waters, guests enjoyed a relaxed day at sea, taking in the vast Arctic seascape from the comfort of the observation decks and lounges. Throughout the day, the Expedition

Team offered engaging presentations, sharing stories and insights to enrich our understanding of the landscapes and cultures that lie ahead of us.

Icebergs of all shapes and sizes drifted silently past the ship, while seabirds followed in our wake. With each passing mile, we drew closer to the High Arctic, a region steeped in exploration history and still full of mystery.

atmosphere was peaceful, with time to take in the surroundings and appreciate the resilience of those who call this place home.



#### Day 7 – Visit to Qaanaaq



village.






### Day 8 – Sea Ice Landing at 78° North






# Day 11 — Visit to Uummannaq

The heavy ice in the bay reminded us of the power and unpredictability of the Arctic environment, a fitting backdrop for a memorable visit in the heart of Greenland.









# Day 12 – Nature Landing at Mila's Cove & Polar Plunge




# Day 13 - Visit to Qeqertarsuaq

beloved part of Greenlandic culture.


The town itself offered a warm welcome, with its colourful houses and peaceful atmosphere, making for a memorable final landing before we continue our journey south.


# Day 14 – Visit to Itilleq & Farewell Moments

Guests were warmly greeted by the local community, and many






#### Disembarkation in Nuuk - Safe Travels!
